## RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Membership cards are $\$ 3.00$ per year. Note: Membership prices can be subject to change.
2. Memberships for following year are retained from prize monies. Membership cards for following year are enclosed with prize winner's cheque.
3. A) The Secretary would appreciate receiving all entries on Strong Agricultural Society Entry Forms for hall exhibits, BEFORE THE FRIDAY PRIOR TO FAIR WEEK.
B) All entry tickets must be prepared by the Secretary or designate.

Please arrange to pick up your entry tickets at an early date.
4. All exhibits for the Hall must be at the Sundridge Strong Joly Arena between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. on the Thursday before the Fair. Please see that entries are properly tagged before leaving home. Judging will begin at 9:00 a.m. sharp on Friday morning. Exhibitors will place exhibits on table provided, and the Chairperson or Directors will place exhibits for display. Garden collections can be placed by the exhibitor. Entry tags must be securely fastened to exhibit. The Chairperson or Directors reserve the right to accept or reject any exhibit.
5. No member shall be allowed more than one entry in any one class (except in livestock), and two in poultry, and no exhibit shall compete for more than one prize (except for sweepstakes).
6. All exhibits of Field or Garden Produce must have been grown during the current year, and all entries of Ladies' Work, Handicrafts, etc. shall be new work and must have been made within the past 2 years. Grains of previous year may be shown. Canning must be from the current year except Cranberry Sauce and Dill Pickles
7. Poultry, Sheep and Swine and cattle must be on the grounds before 10:00 a.m. on the second day of the Fair, as judging of these animals will begin at 10:00 a.m. Horses to be on the grounds by 9:00 a.m., show starts at 9:30 a.m.
8. Exhibitors of Purebred Stock over one year of age must produce Registration Papers when making their entry, and at the time of judging if they should be demanded.

## RULES AND REGULATIONS - CONTINUED

9. No person shall be allowed to interfere with the work of the judges. Decisions of the Judges shall be final, except where a rule of the Society has been violated.
10. Exhibits are at the owner's risk. The Directors will take every reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of articles on exhibition, but will not be responsible for the value of any exhibit that may be lost or damaged.
11. No exhibit may be removed from the Hall until $4: 00$ p.m. on the second day of the Fair. This will be strictly enforced.
12. Juniors exhibiting livestock shall pay a membership of $\$ 1.00$ and shall be given a membership card.
13. Prize monies shall be paid at the Awards Night in October. The Society shall be responsible for the prize monies in so far as the receipts warrant.
14. A) Riding or driving at excessive speeds shall be prohibited.
B) All dogs to be on a leash and under control at all times.
15. Every person making an entry at the Fair, by doing so, agrees to abide by the rules of the Society.
16. The Board of Directors may, from time to time, make further regulations as may be deemed necessary for the proper management of the Society.
17. In case of a dispute, Juniors, if requested, are required to produce proof of age as of the $1^{\text {st }}$ day of the Fair.
18. The Strong Agricultural Society is not responsible for any food entries sold by exhibitors the day of the fair.
19. As of the first day of the fair age categories are as follows unless otherwise stated.
Juniors 12 and under Teens 13-19 Adults 20 and over
Juniors and Teens cannot show in Senior classes.
20. After the fair, the secretary will maintain a box of lost/found exhibits until the Awards Banquet in October.

## TROPHIES

## Stan Darling Trophy for Family Achievement

The purpose of this trophy is to encourage families to work together for a common goal at fairs, and to provide recognition for their achievement. The trophy shall be presented to the family group winning the Highest Number of Points at each Fair. These points must be won in at least three (3) different classes. The winning family shall keep the trophy until the next Fair, where the fair officials will put it up for competition. A family group shall be at least one adult and one or more children living in the same household. Each family will be responsible for recording its own points and presenting the count sheet to the Secretary on Fair Day, if possible. $1^{\text {st }}$ prize is 3 points, $2^{\text {nd }}$ prize is 2 points and $3^{\text {rd }}$ prize is one point for every class in the Fair Prize List. In the event of a tie in points, the winners shall be the family with the greatest number of $1^{\text {st }}$ prizes.

Presented to the winner of the Most Points in Junior Achievement. Winner to keep the trophy and return it at the next Fair for competition.

## Charles Amos Memorial Trophy

Presented to the winner of the Most Points in Senior Vegetables. Winner to keep the trophy and return it at the next Fair for competition.

## Art Wiseman Memorial Trophy

Presented to the winner of the Most Points in Junior Vegetables. Winner to keep the trophy and return it at the next Fair for competition.

## Maple Syrup Producers' Trophy

Presented to the winner of the Most Points in Maple Products. Winner to keep the trophy and return it at the next Fair for competition.

## Joe Hornibrook Memorial Trophy

Bud: Unopened bloom without colour.
Stem: Straight and supporting the bloom(s).
Spike or stalk: One thick upright stem carrying several blooms and/or buds. Collection: A number of cut flowers or foliage OR a number of plants in a single pot OR a number of plants in pots displayed in a larger container will be judged on artistic merit as well as quality and variety of plants shown.

## SUGGESTIONS FOR SPECIMEN EXHIBITS

Use a vase to display specimen exhibit.
Foliage shown will be attached to stems or spike, not shown separate from exhibit.
Ensure your bloom(s) is on a stem, above the top of the container, clearly self-supporting.
Uniformity in size, colour and maturity are important.
Stems are to be strong and straight - even if not visible through the container.
Fresh, healthy, disease-free and insect-free specimens picked at their peak of perfection will have the best chance of winning.

## SUGGESTIONS FOR ARRANGEMENTS

If the category is an arrangement in a vase - use a vase.
For arrangements use a container with or without oasis, wire, sticks, glass, rocks, wood, shells, fabric or ribbons. But all flowers, foliage, fruit or plant material must be grown by exhibitor.
